Introduction

The Englewood Hospital and Medical Center Hospice Program, under the auspices of the Home Health Services Department, has been providing support and comfort to terminally ill individuals and their families since June, 1981.

The team approach is emphasized in providing care to meet the physical, emotional, and spiritual needs of the patient and family.

About Hospice Care

Goals of the Hospice Program

- To allow the patient and family to remain at home together for as long as possible.
- To provide a unique type of care, designed to maintain maximum symptom and pain control, while improving the patient's quality of life and time with loved ones.
- To create community understanding that Hospice is not a place. Most Hospice care takes place in the patient's home environment, although other options, such as inpatient care, are available if necessary.
- To provide 24 hour availability of skilled care to address questions and problems immediately as they occur.
- To maintain contact and continued support to the family in the post-funeral bereavement and healing period.

Hospice Team

The team works together to support the patient and family in the comfort of a home setting. The multi-disciplinary team consists of:

- Physician
- Registered Nurse
- Social Worker
- Hospice Aide
- Volunteer
- Chaplain
- Physical Therapist*
- Nutritionist*

* Available according to the needs of the patients.

Who Benefits from Hospice Care?

- Individuals who are in the advanced stage of a terminal illness.
- Patients for whom supportive care, rather than curative treatment is deemed most appropriate.
- Patients whose family and physician support the Hospice concept.
- Any individual who has been touched by the profound nature of Hospice care — care designed to provide comfort and support to patients and their families.

Geographical Areas Served

Our skilled staff is available to provide Hospice Services to all Bergen County communities.

Hospice care is provided in the comfort and privacy of the patient or family member's home.

If patient care cannot be provided in a home setting, inpatient care may be provided at alternative facilities with financial consideration.

Services Available

- Skilled nursing care – on a part time, intermittent basis, and 24-hour on-call for questions and problems as soon as they may occur.
- Hospice aide service as an extension of skilled nursing.
- Medical equipment and supplies.
- Medication for symptom management.
- Bereavement follow-up by our Hospice team.
- Support groups, led by specially trained professionals.

How to Obtain Hospice Services

- Referral to the Program may be initiated by a physician, the patient, a family member, a nurse or other individual in the community.
- After conferring with the physician, a hospice nurse will visit the patient's home to evaluate medical, cultural, and social needs, and explain the Hospice Program. They will review benefits and services which are available to the patient and family.
- If the patient and family consent to hospice care, and the physician is in agreement, the patient is admitted to the Hospice Program.
